Room locations:

Registration will be in the **Great Hall**.

All talks will be held in **K6.29** (also known as the Anatomy Lecture Theatre).

On 1 April, coffee breaks and lunch will be in the **Great Hall**.

On 2 April, coffee breaks and lunch will be in **K-1.14**.

The poster session on 1 April will be in the **Great Hall**. If you're presenting a poster you can put it up during registration or during the coffee or lunch breaks.

Directions to rooms:

The main entrance to King's is on the Strand, where you find the reception (which is in the Strand Building).

Great Hall:

The Great Hall is on the ground floor of the King's Building.

To/from reception: If you enter from the main entrance on the Strand, pass through reception and continue straight ahead (with the lifts in reception to your right), you will enter the King's building. The Great Hall is a little way down on your left.

K6.29 (Anatomy Lecture Theatre):

This room is on the 6th floor of the King's Building.

To/from the Great Hall: As you exit the Great Hall, there are some lifts directly to your left. Take these lifts to the 6th floor and immediately on your right is K6.29.

To/from reception: Take the lifts in the reception to the 6th floor. Turn right out of these lifts and then immediately right again and pass the stairwell on your left; this takes you to the King's Building. Continue straight ahead, pass the bend in the corridor, and you will find K6.29 on your left.

K-1.14:

This room is on the first basement of the King's building.

To/from K6.29: Turn left out of K6.29 and take the lifts to floor -1. Turn left out of these lifts and K-1.14 is to the left of the stairwell at the end of the corridor.

Maps of the relevant floors of the King's building follow.

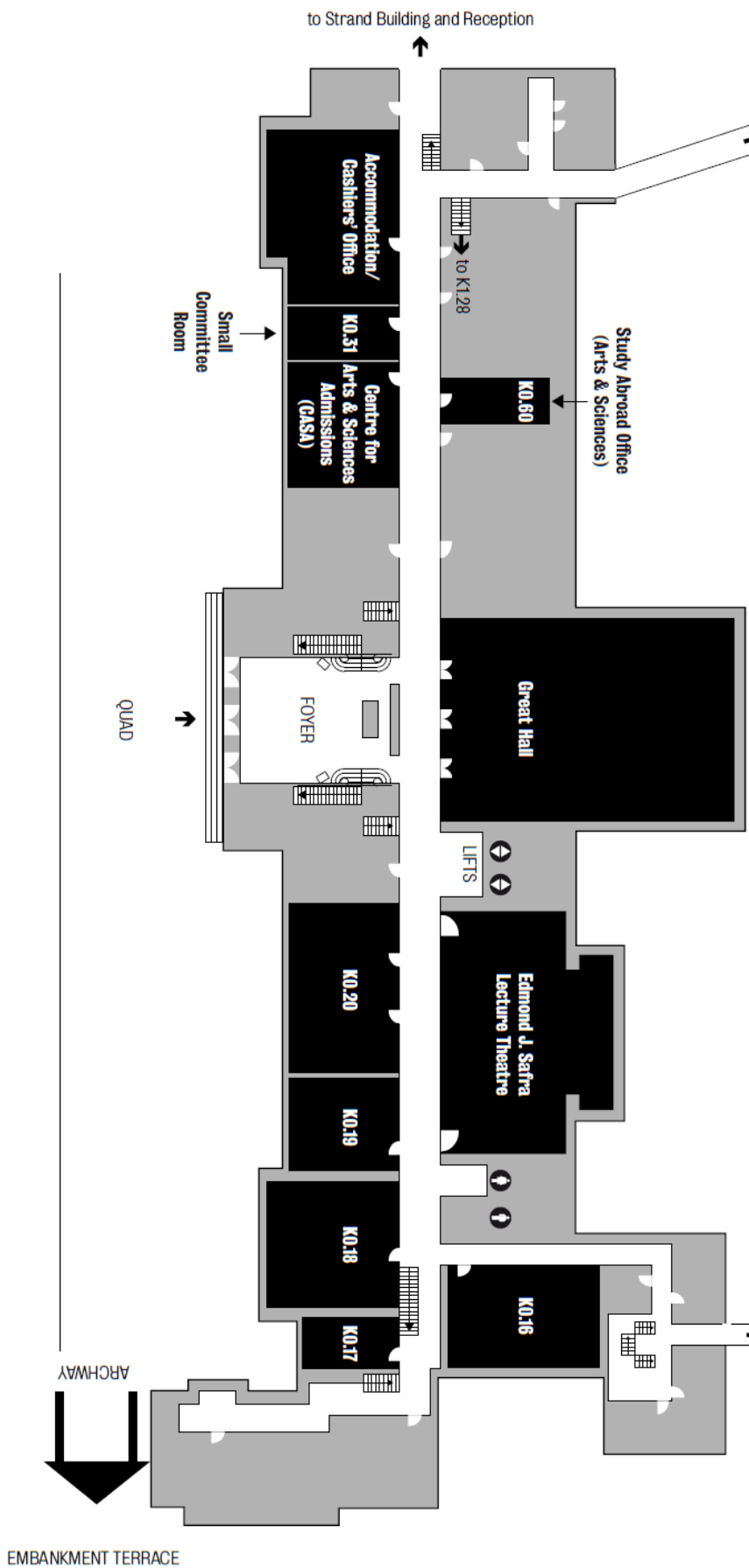

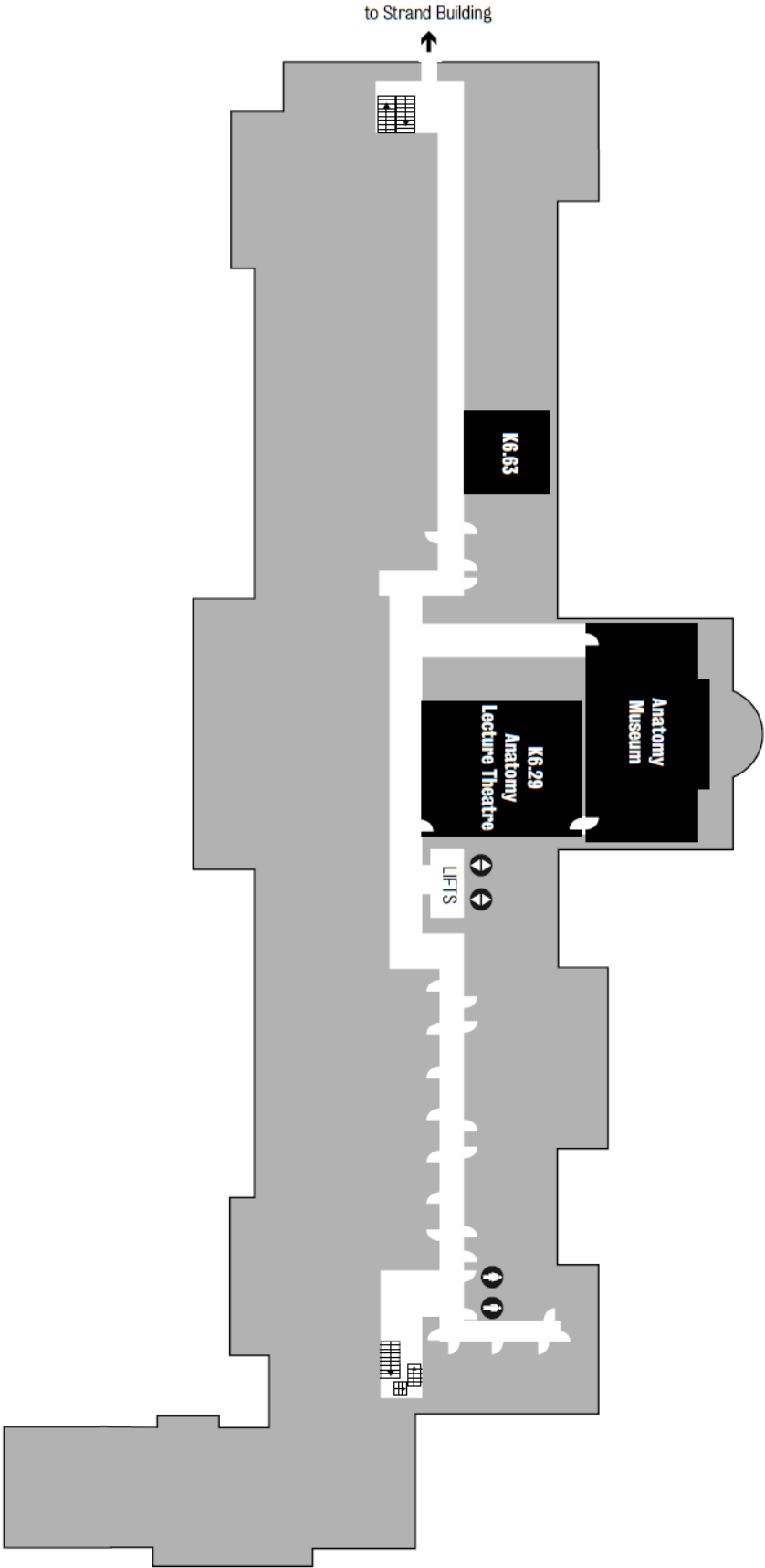
